Introduction

The extractive sector in Tanzania is expanding and projected to be a major contributor to the national economy and rural livelihoods. Despite this potential, the sector experiences a range of challenges including environmental, social, cultural, and human rights which all negatively affect equitable sharing of the benefits accrued from the sector. Additionally, there is inadequate knowledge and skills for communities to meaningfully participate in the decision across the value chain of the extractive sector. This demands for industry specific skills and knowledge development for emerging leaders and practitioners who can engage effectively in the extractive sector governance.

Since 2009, there are recipients from Tanzania who have attended extractive capacity enhancement initiatives at regional and global level. For multiplier effects, the alumni have been expected, to apply their competencies and transfer the acquired skills and knowledge to other practitioners in their localities. However, the execution of the said expectation has been limited or redundant. Poor Coordination, organized platform and inadequate resources affect the expected process of transferring the acquired knowledge and skills to others.

To address the above, under the Extractive Sector Knowledge Transfer Incubator Tanzania (ESKi Tanzania), HakiRasilimali and MS-Training Center for Development Cooperation (MS-TCDC) co-created a short course program titled "Fundamentals of Community led Advocacy in Mining, Oil and Gas Governance" that will result in the ability of extractive host communities to push for demand side driven advocacy agendas hence influencing sectoral Policies and Practices.

What is ESKi Tanzania?

ESKi Tanzania is a capacity enhancement program tailored to nurture the next line of community based civil society leaders and practitioners (from the local government authorities, media and other fraternity) engaging in extractive governance to amplify citizen voices in influencing policies and practices in the extractive sector. The program intends to benefit emerging leaders and practitioners who have limited or no prior expert knowledge and experience in the extractive sector governance. Furthermore, equipping them with basic knowledge, skills and tools to enhance their engagements with industry leaders, policy makers and other key stakeholders on mining, oil and natural gas governance in Tanzania.

Artisanal and Small-Scale Mining (ASM)	This module offers a global concept of ASM, National context, opportunities and challenges; comparative ASM assessment of policies and practices (success and failures).
Extractives and Local Development.	This module offers an overview of the linkages between local economic development and opportunities surrounding the extractive industry.
Human Rights in the extractives.	This module recognizes the potential negative impact of extractives on land, environment and people.
Extractives, Environment and Climate Change.	This module considers the linkages between resource extraction and environmental sustainability by critically looking at how resource extraction impacts on environment and climate change.
Gender and the extractives.	This module examines the fact that the impacts of the extractives industry are experienced differently by men and women (across different age groups).

Community led Advocacy (Policy and practice).	This module sets to equip participants with requisite tools and skills to engage with policy makers, corporations and other key actors at sub national level.
Communication and information dissemination techniques	This module provides participants with skills on how to communicate advocacy using both alternative forms of using traditional and new media.

Overall Objectives

By the end of the training, participants will be able to; To reduce the gap between theoretical and practical learning in the extractive sectors in Tanzania and facilitate knowledge and skills transfer between industry experts and citizens, especially community leaders from the host communities.

Gain skills and knowledge to be able to articulate key concepts and issues in the extractive sector.

Use acquired skills and tools to advance community led advocacy and enhance synergies within extractive sector spaces for improved policy and practice.

Our Approach

The fifteen-days (15) course deploys a Participatory Adult Learning Approach (PALA) whereby, Swahili and English are the main languages for facilitation.

Methodology

Expert presentations and narrations; Brainstorming, Group discussion and exercises; Questions and answers sessions; Role play sessions; Traditional story-telling, Experts talks, Case studies, Field visits, Videos, animations, mentorship and coaching sessions. Generally, Learning Uptake (Knowledge based sharing – 60%; Experience Sharing – 30%; Networking – 10%).
